HISTORY OF SOUTHILL

- Southill was built in the 1960s to provide housing for people with no homes
- 1200 houses built in the beginning between the four estates; O' Malley, Kincora, Carew and Keys
- Built with no facilities; just houses
- It gained a bad reputation due to crime rates rising in the area from antisocial behaviour

The community hall hosts events such as bingo


